

1 Archbishop's Palace & Museum, Gilles Aycelin Tower



The second most important group of archbishopric buildings in France after Avignon's. Inner courtyards, Synod buildings, Consul and Synod halls, Gilles Aycelin Tower, art collection.

2 Saint-Just et Saint-Pasteur Church, its Treasure room and Cloister

Its monumental Gothic choir was built between 1272 and 1332. It is the highest in the south of France.



Do not miss: the carved reredos in the Notre Dame de Bethléem chapel, a masterpiece of European Gothic sculpture from the 14th century; the Treasure room and its peculiar acoustic effect; the Annonciade Chapel (15th century) and its Cloister.



3 Via Domitia

Place de l'Hôtel-de-Ville

The Via Domitia, which linked Italy and Spain in the second century BC and was discovered in 1997, is a stunning memento of the twenty-one-century-old ancient town.

4 Terrace, Archbishop's Garden



Adjacent to the 14th century cloister, the garden is a peaceful place adorned with a sundial and a terrace displaying contemporary art.

5 Old Chapel « des Pénitents Bleus »

18th century chapel of baroque style. Restored in 1995. It now hosts art exhibits.

6 Roman Horreum



Roman underground tunnels probably used as a warehouse in the late 1st century BC. One of a kind in Europe.

7 La Poudrière

This old 17th century gunpowder magazine now hosts art exhibits.

8 La Médiathèque



This 900 sq. m. cultural center is a modern building housing the very latest knowledge.

9 Palais du Travail

Of neoclassical style, this vast building in reinforced concrete was designed by Joachim Genard in 1938.

10 Place du Forum



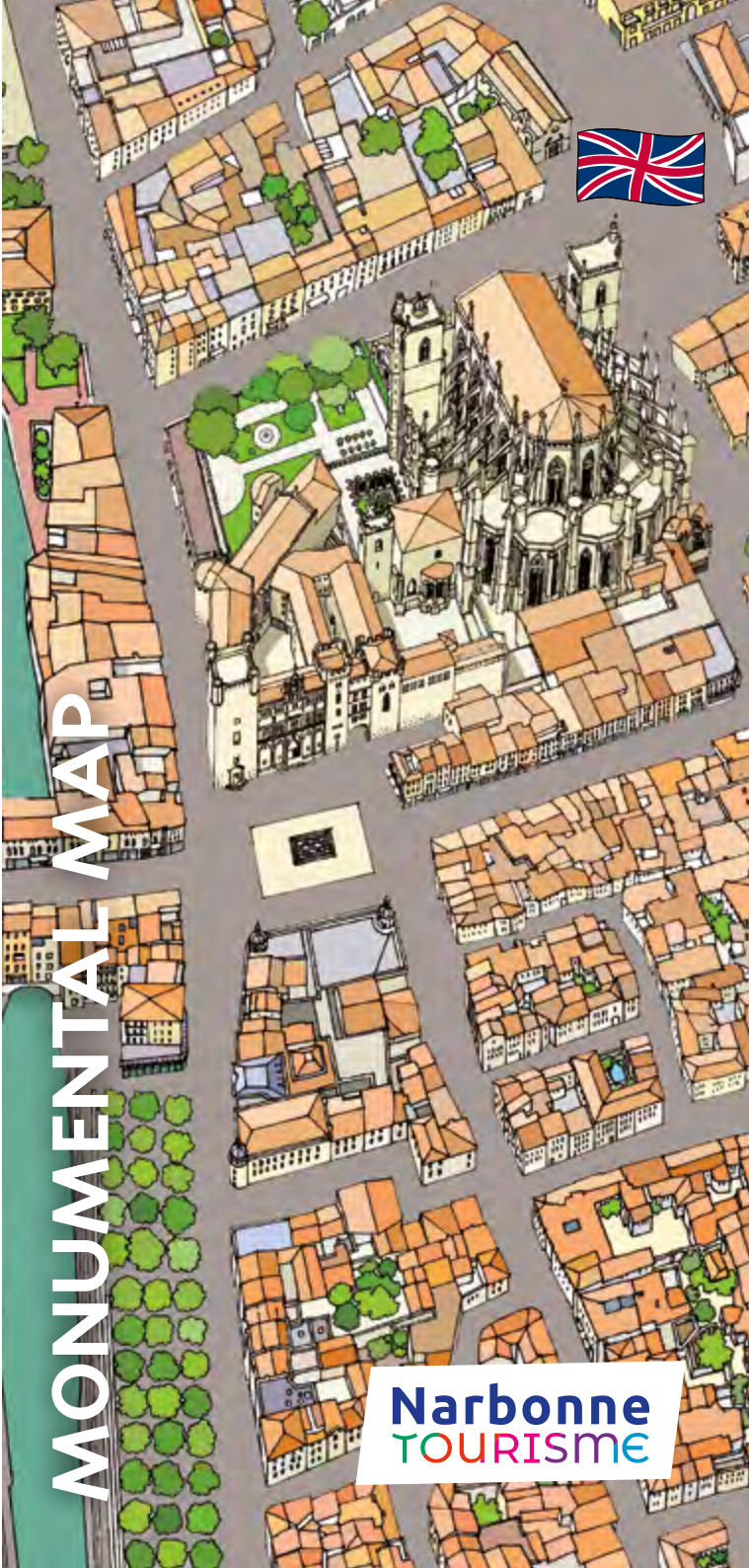
This square is on the old grounds of the Forum, once overlooked by a great Capitoline temple, now destroyed. The fountain is a replica of the one built here in the 17th century.

11 Saint-Sébastien Church

This charming 15th century church of Flamboyant Gothic style was the Carmelite convent chapel up until the French Revolution.

12 Promenade des Barques

The shade from the century-old trees makes this place a cool haven in the heart of town. Market every Thursday and Sunday (morning).



13 Cours Mirabeau



The iconic promenade on the right bank of the Canal where the market takes place every Thursday and Sunday (morning).

14 Pont des Marchands



This inhabited bridge, in UNESCO's World Heritage list, links the suburbs and the city. It once had 7 arches and was on the path of the Via Domitia.

15 Charles Trenet's birthplace

13, av. Charles-Trenet



Charles Trenet was born in this house on 18th May 1913. Throughout his life, he viewed this house as a refuge, a secret place for inspiration. The scenography highlights the eternal youth of the "mad singer".

16 Place des Quatre Fontaines and Maison des Inquants



The square is named after the fountain and its four spouts in its center. It formerly was the main square in the Bourg quarter: the Place du Consulat. It opens onto Rue Berlioz and the beautiful 14th century façade of the Maison des Inquants, an old fabric exchange.

17 Saint-Paul Basilica



One of the oldest Gothic churches in the south of France. It was built on the remains of an ancient paleochristian cemetery (3rd and 4th centuries). Its architecture is particular in that it is a combination of Romanesque and Gothic styles. Its font is famous for the carved frog in it.

18 Maison des Trois Nourrices



One of the most outstanding examples of private architecture from the Renaissance in the region and unique to Narbonne. It is named after the caryatids around the south window.

19 Old Church « des Augustins »

16th century church, of late Gothic style, in the old Bourg quarter.

20 Notre Dame de Lamourguier Church



A rare example of the Gothic style from the south of France. It was decommissioned after the French Revolution and housed the lapidary museum from 1869 to 2018.

21 Les Halles (market hall)



In the heart of Narbonne, the century-old market welcomes hungry strollers, budding chefs and gourmets from all over. Olives, hones, thyme, rosemary, oyster, sardines: the market hall gives you a taste of the nearby Mediterranean.
